

Dr. Frank "Tick" Coleman '35

Dr. Frank "Tick" (as he is widely and affectionately known) Coleman was a native Philadelphian who had advised and counseled young people for over 70 years. He was a member of Lincoln University's Board of Trustees as Emeritus Trustee.

Tick Coleman graduated from the Logan Elementary School and Central High School. He was inducted into the Central HS Hall of Fame.

He held Bachelor and Doctorate Degrees from Lincoln University, and a Master's Degree from The Pennsylvania School of Social Work. He held two first distinctions, he was the first black quarterback on the Central High School Public League Championship teams in 1929 and 1930, and he was the first Black member of the area all scholastic High School Football Team in 1929. He was one of the three first Black Scouts to earn the highest honor: the Eagle Scout Badge. The Boy Scouts of America have named a service award in his honor.

In 1981 he retired from the School District of Philadelphia. Tick Coleman has done extensive community work serving in leadership capacities with the Christian St. YMCA, the Wharton Settlement, the Wissahickon Boys Club, the Philadelphia Recreation Dept., the Salvation Army, the Dept. of Public Assistance, the Peace Corps, the Neighborhood Hebrew Center, the South Side Day Camp, the Bill Berry League, and the Barrett Home & School Association. In addition, he was president of the NAACP for ten years. He served on the Lansdowne Board of Education; he coached football, basketball, swimming and track.

Tick Coleman received Lincoln University's Outstanding Alumnus Award, and The Philadelphia Community Award. He was an ordained Deacon, and a member of the Lincoln University Board of Trustees. His football helmet and shoes are on exhibition at the African-American Museum in Philadelphia.

In 1994, Dr. Coleman was honored by the Greater Philadelphia Chapter of the National Society of Fund Raising Executives, and he was honored for 66 years of service by Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Inc. In February 2004, he was honored by the Philadelphia 76ers and the Philadelphia Tribune with the Community Service All-Star Award.

Dr. Coleman was a member of the Union Baptist Church where he was baptized in 1927. He has served on the Deacon Board for over 40 years, is a member of the Scholarship Committee. Dr. Coleman was a devoted father, grandfather and great-grandfather.

Dr. Coleman passed away in December of 2008, but not before achieving his lifelong dream. That dream was to see football return to his revered Alma Mater Lincoln University. Through the glorious efforts of President Dr. Ivory Nelson, the Lincoln University Board of Trustees, and some very dedicated and committed Alumni, Tick was able to attend and actually



sit on the sidelines as he watched his beloved Lions triumph in their first football game in 48 years.

Honoree

ERIC J. BECOATS, ED.D. '88

Eric J. Becoats is a native of Baltimore, Maryland. He graduated from Lincoln University with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Accounting in 1988. Becoats earned a Master of Science Degree in Finance from Johns Hopkins University in 1992 and a

Doctorate of Education in Educational Leadership from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte in 2001. He is a Lifetime Member of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. and currently serves as the Superintendent of the William Penn School District in Pennsylvania.

Becoats has more than 28 years of experience in Education, which includes having served as a Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent and Chief of Staff in several North Carolina school districts. In 2012, Becoats was recognized as the Superintendent of the Year by the National Association of Black School Educators (NABSE).

Immediately prior to joining the William Penn School District, he served as Assistant Superintendent in the School District of Philadelphia. Some of his most notable achievements in Philadelphia include developing a school equity turnaround model for 19 schools serving more than 9,000 students in grades K-12, developing and implementing instructional data protocols for 19 network schools in grades K-12, successfully training 19 principals on research based data-drive instructional practices, and increasing the number of Network Schools showing improvement in student achievement by 80% within one year.

In the William Penn School District, Becoats successfully directed and led the development of the district's Strategic Plan – Focus Forward 2025, a four year plan currently underway to guide the districts' actions to improve outcomes for students.

Becoats is a resident of Delaware County, PA and currently serves as the Parliamentarian of the Alumni Association of Lincoln University Philadelphia Chapter and Membership Chair of the National Alumni Association of Lincoln University. Becoats is the proud father of two children, Braxton and Jadyn. His philosophical belief is that he "Exists to Serve"!





Honoree

SANDRA MARIGNA HARMON '81

Sandra Marigna Harmon is a community servant, an advocate for the underserved, and an educator. She is an agent of social change and a successful entrepreneur.

Born and raised in New Jersey, and later relocating to Pennsylvania, Sandra graduated from Bensalem (PA) High School, before attending Lincoln University of PA in the fall of 1977. As a proud member of the "President's Class", Sandra earned her Bachelor of Science Degree in the spring of 1981.

Her professional career began in the early 1980's as an educator with the Archdiocese of Los Angeles and the Los Angeles Unified School District. She taught at St. Michael's High School for Girls, where she established the school's first Dance Company, and coached both the Girls Basketball and Volleyball Teams. During her time spent as an educator, Sandra recruited graduate school candidates for the Educational Advancement Alliance Graduate School Preparatory Program and as a Behavioral Intervention and Management Team Lead at Hope Charter High School in Philadelphia.

Sandra has served as Outreach Crisis Intervention Coordinator, Director of Behavioral Partial Hospitalization and Geriatric Intensive Outpatient Programs with Albert Einstein Medical Center and Belmont Behavioral Health Centers, in Philadelphia, PA. Her professional career blossomed when she joined the Nicetown Community Development Corporation (CDC) of Philadelphia as the Outreach and Community Engagement Director. Her role provided support and stabilization measures for this community, which suffers with a 51% poverty rate that has left it's residents at extreme risks of violence, illness and homelessness.

With the tragic onset of Covid-19, Sandra earned a certification in Disease Containment from Johns Hopkins University and joined the Covid Containment Division of the Philadelphia Department of Public Health. Currently, she leads a team of Resource and Response Specialist who have been essential in mitigating the spread of the virus and currently providing leadership as our city recovers from the devastating toll.

In 2002, with her passion for crafting, she began creating curative and therapeutic skin remedies. Sandra launched Shea Gotta Have It, LLC. She began learning her craft from her late mother Marjorie Marigna, who taught her the benefits of natural healing and alternative treatments since many traditional western medicines were caustic and ineffective to her own skincare and maladies. Sandra Marigna Harmon is celebrating 20 years as CEO and Creative Director. Her signature shea butter products are a shelf staple on the Lincoln University Campus Store shelves since Oct. 2017, as well as in numerous salons, shops and boutiques in the tri-state area. Her company continues to grow.

Sandra's greatest blessings are her beloved daughters and her beautiful and talented granddaughter. This beautiful Lincoln legacy includes Shonda Marigna, class of 2006 and 2017 and her youngest daughter, Aziza, who is a rising graduate at our alma mater; a member of the resilient class of 2022.

Sandra is a member of the Philadelphia AALU where she has worked on various committees to include the Tick Coleman Awards Luncheon, Sunshine & Hospitality; past Chairperson and wherever vendors and entrepreneurs can be found. She is also a long-standing member of our Lincoln University National Alumni Association and remains active with several community and civic organizations in Philadelphia. In May 2021, Sandra was the proud recipient of the prestigious Lincoln University Alumni Service Award. Sandra remains a devoted member of Bethlehem AME Church in Burlington, NJ since her birth.



Honoree

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR SHEILA Y. OLIVER '74

Lieutenant Governor Oliver is a selfdescribed "Jersey Girl," born and raised in an ethnically diverse Newark neighborhood.

Lieutenant Governor Oliver was inspired as a young girl to be a fighter for the voiceless when her eyes were opened to societal injustices and inequalities around her, often

citing "A Tale of Two Cities" as her youth awakening. She has since pioneered a successful career in public service advocating for social justice, women's equality, and education, ultimately becoming the first woman of color to serve in a statewide elected office in New Jersey history. In 2021, Lt. Governor Oliver was reelected to serve a second term in office.

In addition to her role as Lieutenant Governor, she serves as Commissioner of the Department of Community Affairs, where she has led efforts to strengthen and expand initiatives for fair and affordable housing, community revitalization, homelessness prevention, and local government services that support New Jersey's 564 municipalities.

Under her leadership, the Department has also expanded and leveraged a wide range of initiatives aimed at assisting distressed municipalities, including the federal Opportunity Zones tax incentive, the Main Street New Jersey program, the Neighborhood Preservation Program, the Neighborhood Revitalization Tax Credit program, and the Urban Enterprise Zone Program, which was renewed by legislation she signed in 2021.

In her role as Acting Governor, she has signed multiple bills into law, including those that established a Caregiver Task Force to identify ways to support people taking care of loved ones who are elderly or disabled, require all public school students in grades 6-8 to receive financial literacy education, strengthen equal pay for equal work by preventing employers from asking employees' previous salary history, and protect employees from wage theft. She also signed into law legislation that established a Restorative and Transformative Justice for Youths and Communities Pilot Program within the Juvenile Justice Commission to help divert youth from entering and re-entering the juvenile justice system.

Across her career, Lieutenant Governor Oliver has worked in the public, nonprofit, and private sectors, and has taught numerous college courses. She has served as a member of both the East Orange Board of Education and the Essex County Board of Chosen Freeholders.


In 2003, she was elected to serve the 34^{th} Legislative District in the New Jersey General Assembly.

A trailblazer in every sense of the word, in 2010 she became the first African-American woman in state history to serve as Assembly Speaker, and just the second in the nation's history to lead a state legislative house.

A proud alumna of the Newark public school system, Lieutenant Governor Oliver graduated cum laude from Lincoln University, and received her Master of Science Degree in Community Organization, Planning and Administration from Columbia University. She has received honorary doctorates of humane letters from the New Jersey Institute of Technology, Lincoln University, Montclair University and Berkeley and Essex County Colleges.

She is a proud 40-plus-year resident of East Orange where she treasures her time with her 94-year-old mother, who has always encouraged her to be a critical thinker while fostering her passion for helping people through effective public policy.







REV. DR. CALVIN MORRIS '63

Minister, historian and human rights advocate the **Reverend Dr. Calvin** Sylvester Morris was born March 16, 1941, in Philadelphia. He attended Meade Elementary School and Vaux Junior High School. Morris was awarded a partial scholarship to Friends Select High School, a

private Quaker school known for its high standards. One of two black students in his class, Morris graduated with honors in 1959. He then went on to Lincoln University in Oxford, Pennsylvania graduating cum laude in 1963 with a B.A. in history. At Boston University, he earned an M.A. in history in 1964 and an S.B.T. in theology in 1967. Morris was also ordained in the United Methodist Church.

Later in 1967, Morris moved to Chicago to work on his Ph.D., but was asked by the Reverend Jesse Jackson to become the associate director and national coordinator of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference's Operation Breadbasket, now the Rainbow/ PUSH Coalition. He served from 1967 to 1971, through the assassinations of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Fred Hampton. Breadbasket attracted activists and celebrities like Fannie Lou Hamer, Bill Cosby, Julius "Cannonball" Adderly, Rosa Parks, Bishop Desmond Tutu, Mahalia Jackson and Sammy Davis, Jr.

From 1971 to 1973, Morris was coordinator of the African American Studies Program at Simmons College in Boston. As executive director of Atlanta's Martin Luther King, Jr. Center for Non-Violent Social Change from 1973 to 1976, Morris was again associated with SCLC as he worked directly with Coretta Scott King. In 1976, he began a sixteenyear professional association with Howard University's School of Divinity during which he worked as director of ministries to church and Society, director of field education and associate professor of pastoral theology. Morris earned his Ph.D. in American history from Boston University in 1982. He was executive vice president of Academic Services and academic dean at Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta from 1992 to 1998. Chicago's Community Renewal Society (CRS) hired Morris as executive director in 1998. At CRS, Morris presides over two publications, a staff of forty-seven and a budget of \$4.5 million.

Morris is a board member of the Golden Apple Foundation, Chicago Chamber Musicians, Chicago Theater Company, Sojourner and the Wieboldt Foundation. He is a co-convener of the Justice Coalition of Greater Chicago and is a co-chairman of Jobs for Justice Clergy Committee. Morris was elected treasurer of the Board of Trustees of Lincoln University, his alma mater. He lives near his daughter in Chicago.

RICHARDEAN SMALLS '75

Richardean Smalls, a Philadelphia native, Psychology from Lincoln University in 1975 and a Master's degree in Education from Temple University in 1978.

A member of the AALU Philadelphia Chapter, she initially joined in 1975 and fondly remembers attending alumni meetings held at the old Christian Street YMCA with Frank "Tick" Coleman and other Lincoln legends from the Philadelphia area.

Ms. Smalls taught at the A. L. Fitzpatrick Elementary School in Philadelphia for 35 years until her retirement in 2014. In addition to her position as a Special Education Teacher, Richardean served as a New Teacher Mentor, School Reorganization Facilitator, and was the school's Special Education Liaison from 1998 until 2014. She has received recognition and various commendations for her service with the School District of Philadelphia, including The Rose Lindenbaum Teacher of the Year Award.

While attending Lincoln, Richardean worked as a Tutor-Counselor for the Lincoln University Upward Bound Program. From the early 1980's until September 2020, she served as the L.U.U.B. Philadelphia Enrichment Center Supervisor during the academic school years providing Philadelphia area high school students, enrolled in the program, with academic instruction and tutoring to enable them to improve and maintain their grade point averages, successfully complete high school and enroll in post-secondary education programs. She also developed individualized instructional activities to help her students prepare for and improve their scores on the SATs and ACTs. For many years, Ms. Smalls was a Tutor–Counselor and Program Instructor during the 6-week summer component on Lincoln's campus. Over the years, she remained devoted to helping fulfill the program's mission and is thankful for having had the privilege to be a part of the L.U. Upward Bound Program success story for over forty of its fifty-five plus year existence under the leadership of three dedicated and committed directors: Mr. Herschel Bailey '66, Dr. Susan Powell, and Ms. Denise Baker '06.

A member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., Richardean was initiated through Zeta Omega Chapter in the Fall of 1974, and is an active member of Quaker City Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta. Richardean attends the Vine Memorial Baptist Church where she is Assistant Church Clerk and serves in the Deaconess, Missionary, and Usher ministries. She is a volunteer for the Philadelphia Martin Luther King Jr. Association for Nonviolence, Inc. Annual Children's Christmas Dinner Party, held in December, and for the Annual Awards and Benefit Luncheon held on MLK Jr. Day.





Richard M. Gordon IV is a nationally acclaimed award-winning educator who has been the Principal of Paul Robeson High School for Human Services, in West Philadelphia, for approximately nine (9) years. In 2012, the School District of Philadelphia's \$1.35 billion deficit during the city's historic and unprecedented financial crisis crippled city public school budgets throughout the entire school system. Prior to his appointment in 2013, Paul Robeson High School was amongst 30 economically disadvantaged, underperforming schools that had been targeted for permanent closure aimed at balancing the School District's budget, displacing students hailing from the city's poorest neighborhoods. Following his assumption of leadership, Mr. Gordon led the school through a period of transformation, from which it emerged with more than 40 accolades, including the 2017 Most Improved High School in the City of Philadelphia.

Fostering a sense of personal empowerment and a dedication to career building among his students, Principal Gordon is credited with developing a model college & career readiness program, most notably developing his "Build Your Own Brand" program that assists students in forging a personalized pathway to success following graduation. Furthermore, he established a socio-emotional learning environment through which pupils could feel safe, connected. and invested in their lessons, as well as learn the benefits of wellness, open communication, and self-reflection. With a 100% minority student population (95% African American) and a 100% school population largely living beneath the poverty line, Mr. Gordon has been credited for achieving a 95% annual graduation rate, significantly higher than the city average of 70%.

An experienced and passionate educational administrator, Mr. Gordon credits his success to more than 26 years of experience as an educator, previously taught regular and special education, worked as a discipline and truancy liaison and served as an assistant principal, and Principal. Over the years, he has been honored with various accolades for his commitment to advancing student achievement for minority students and fostering a sense of family, which inspires unity throughout the entire school community and a positive culture of learning supportive of all students and their families. In 2019, the Pennsylvania State Department of Education recognized Principal Gordon for Paul Robeson High School becoming a "High Progress" school, removing it from State's list of academically "high needs"/lowest performing schools. Principal Gordon has been nationally recognized as the Principal of the Year on three occasions, including the National Principal of the Year via the National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP) in 2021, the National Principal of the Year through the National Alliance for Black School Educators in 2019 and the National School Administrator of the Year by Education Dive Magazine in 2017. Mr. Gordon was also celebrated as the Pennsylvania State Principal of the Year in 2020 and received both the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Social Change Community Education Award from the University of Pennsylvania and the 2021 Lincoln University Alumni Professional Achievement Award.

Esteemed for his perspective on poverty and education, Mr. Gordon notably contributed an article in the May 2021 edition of the NASSP Principal Leadership Magazine. The article, "Growing Up in Poverty," expounds upon his experiences teaching and working with disadvantaged students. In accounting for his success, Mr. Gordon cites the influence of his own childhood, during which time he grew up in largely the same circumstances as many of his current students. His empathy with the plight of his students has allowed him to build strong relationships with kindred spirits and offer his own story as an example for those who view him as a role model. Throughout the course of his career, Mr. Gordon is incredibly proud to have helped various students discover their own potential and enter adulthood with the confidence to find their own paths forward. His media profile has also been greatly enhanced by the endorsements of several prominent figures in Philadelphia, including Mayor Jim Kenney, Chief Education Officer Otis Hackney, and the entire City Council of Philadelphia who laud Mr. Gordon as one of the best school principals in the city.

A dedicated advocate for his community, Mr. Gordon presently contributes to the board of directors for several nonprofit organizations, such as the U.S. Department of Education's Regional Educational Laboratory Programs – Mid-Atlantic, Musicopia Incorporated and the Pennsylvania Principals Association. Additionally, he has been active as a community advisor for the University of Pennsylvania's Barbara and Edward Netter Center for Community Partnerships. Mr. Gordon also participates on the advisory board of the Mayor's Office of Black Male Engagement's Black Male Mentoring Initiative, as a member of the Philadelphia Academy of School Leaders and as a member the Schoolmen's Club of Philadelphia.

A former resident of New Jersey, Mr. Gordon graduated from Pennsauken High School. He subsequently obtained a Bachelor of Arts in social studies education at Lincoln University, a Master of Arts in special education at Coppin State College and a Master of Science in educational leadership at Lehigh University. Mr. Gordon is currently pursuing a Doctor of Education in educational leadership at Northcentral University, with an anticipated graduation date of 2024.
